





New Innovations

1789 Samuel Slater came to America and brought with him the knowledge to help build the first water powered spinning textile mill in America.

1793 Eli Whitney invented the first cotton gin...planting the seeds for a booming cotton industry.

The Rise.

The Boston Manufacturing Company _____

In 1813, Francis Cabot Lowell established The Boston Manufacturing Company.

This new textile mill integrated all the steps of turning raw cotton into cloth into one mill...this was the start of the Industrial Revolution.

In 1860, over 60% of American exports was raw cotton. Of the cotton produced, the Boston Manufacturing Company was responsible for 1/5 of production.



By 1870, there were 2,400 woolen mills and hundreds of cotton mills in the United States; not only did the people working in the mills work together, they worshipped together, and their lives were centered around this community.

The Peak.

Southern Dominance

The textile industry dominated the South, as **employment** in the textile industry peaked in June **1948** with **1.3 million jobs**.








The Fall. The Growth of Offshoring

During the 1960's about 95% of apparel worn in the U.S. was made here, now that number is down to less than 3%.

Roughly **650** textile plants closed between **1997-2009**.

industry.




13,225 Textile Mills in the US as of 2022.

States with the greatest number of Textile Mills businesses in the U.S.

- California (168 businesses)
- Florida (123 businesses)
- Texas (109 businesses)

The number of businesses in the Textile Mills industry in the US has declined 1.4% per year on average over the five years between 2017 -2022.

The United States imported a total of \$127.7 billion in textiles in 2019.



The United States is the 2nd largest market for apparel consumption in the world.


501,755

Reinvigoration and Reinvention


The U.S. textile industry invested \$20.9 billion in new plants and equipment from 2012 to 2021.

Recently, U.S. manufacturers have opened new facilities throughout the textile production chain, including recycling facilities to convert textile and other waste to new textile uses and resins.










